# Themes Inherent in the Text

### To Kill a Mockingbird | Harper Lee

**Theme.** A theme is a main idea that an author is trying to reveal through a piece of writing. While **prejudice** is a theme, it is a very broad term. You will need to be more specific in your identification of themes. For example, a theme might be: *Racial prejudice as demonstrated by* ... This gives me an idea of what kind of prejudice is inherent in the novel. Below, I have given you broad themes. In the chart, be more specific and elaborate on the broad themes provided.

The narrator or another character state some themes <u>directly</u> in the novel:

**Courage** . "I wanted you to see what real courage is, instead of getting the idea that courage is a man with a gun in his hand."

**Empathy**. "You never really understand a person until you consider things from his point of view—until you climb into his [or her] skin and walk around in it."

**Insight**. "Most people are [nice]...when you finally see them."

**Persecution**. "It's a sin to kill a mockingbird...[they] don't do one thing but make music for us to enjoy." In other words, it's a sin to persecute someone who has done no harm but only good.

#### Other themes implied indirectly:

- End of Innocence Growing up usually brings with it an end of innocence.
- Educational Shortcomings Educational practices often achieve the opposite result from that intended.
- Hypocrisy in Adults Adults are often hypocritical.
- Don't Judge a Book by Its Cover Appearance is often different from reality.
- Happiness in Belonging Children must feel needed to be happy.
- Childhood Clarity Children, with fewer prejudices, sometimes see the truth more clearly than adults.
- Contentment "Fine folks" are those people who do the best they can with what they have.
